RE: Authorize the purchase of (9) 2017 Ford Interceptor AWD Marked Police Patrol Vehicles

from Don Reid Ford Fleet Sales for the amount of \$254,997.00

Action Statement:

Authorize the purchase of (9) 2017 Marked Ford Police Interceptor AWD Sedans at a unit/vehicle cost of \$28,333.00 (\$254,997.00 total) from Don Reid Ford, pursuant to the Florida State Purchasing contract 25100000-16-1 effective 11/17/15 thru 11/16/17.

Background:

The Key West Police Department is budgeted this fiscal year (FY16/17) to purchase (9) Marked Ford Interceptor Police Patrol Sedans. These Police specific vehicles are replacing 2009 and 2010 Ford Crown Victoria's. The Police Department is committed to the Cities sustainability goals and plans to integrate hybrid vehicles for civilian uses.

Quotes and specifications for all vehicles may have different codes for aftermarket or OEM equipment depending on the contract. All the equipment listed whether dealer installed or OEM from the factory is the same.

Don Reid Ford, the awarded dealer for this model of Police Interceptor, has the lowest quote for the Marked Interceptor AWD sedan under the State of Florida Vehicle Purchasing Contract.

Marked Police Sedan:

Don Reid- State Contract Quote \$28,333.00 Alan Jay-NJPA Contract Quote \$31,500.00 Hub City-Florida Sheriff's Quote \$31,755.00

These (9) vehicles will be marked patrol units assigned to the Patrol Bureau. The Office of Law Enforcement Standards (OLES) and the National Institute of Standards and Technology develop equipment standards based on laboratory evaluation of commercially available products. Police vehicles are part of the equipment tested annually by the State of Michigan Department of State Police. A comprehensive evaluation is completed on the

vehicles that meet the standards established by OLES. The 2017 Police Ford Interceptor meets the OLES standards.

As in previous fiscal years the use of the Ford Police Interceptor AWD Sedan package has proven to be reliable and mechanically equal to the older Crown Victoria's still in use by the department. The 2017 Interceptor AWD Sedan is now a proven platform in use by the department that was designed to replace the existing Crown Victoria's. As with the Crown Victoria, this vehicle is designed specifically to meet the needs of police road patrol duties and is expected to perform well in all categories.

Based upon the above data and evaluation, standard equipment, 5 star NHSTA frontal crash test rating, fail safe cooling systems, electrical and ergonomic improvements to the platform, dealer relationship, city maintenance history on the current Interceptors in use, and the manufacturers commitment to Law Enforcement, the Fleet Services Division of the City of Key West recommends the 2017 Ford Police Interceptor AWD Sedan.

Purpose and Justification:

The vehicles described are necessary to maintain proper function of essential components of the Police Department. These vehicles are replacing 2009 and 2010 Crown Victoria's that have surpassed their useful service life as police vehicles.

Vehicle Specifications and cost are as follows: (9) 2017 Marked Patrol Ford Police Interceptor AWD Sedans, \$28,333.00 per vehicle. (see attached brochure).


Options:

One option is to purchase the vehicles from Don Reid Ford Fleet Sales, via the Florida State Purchasing contract for police vehicles in compliance with city ordinance 2-797(3). This option would allow for the City of Key West to purchase the needed vehicles according to the exact specifications required and at the lowest cost to the City of Key West. The purchase of these vehicles provides important tools for public safety, worker efficiency and delivery of professional police service to the community. The local Ford Dealer, Duncan Ford declined to offer a bid for these vehicles.

Another option is to forgo the purchase of the vehicles. This would result in an increasing lack of functionality from using seven and nine year old vehicles, as well as increased public safety risks and increased cost to maintain a fleet past its useful and reliable service life.









Financial Impact:

The purchase of these vehicles is budgeted in the Police Department's FY16/17 budget in account #101-2101-521-6400.

Recommendation:

The Key West Police Department recommends the purchase of these vehicles and believes it is in the best interest of the City of Key West to do so.
