Re: Heritage Tree Nomination

Dear Members of the Key West Tree Commission and Ms. DeMaria,

Please accept this nomination for our beautiful, old, Sapodilla Tree (Manilkara Zopota) to be named a Heritage Tree.

It is located in front of my home at 724 Eaton Street and has provided shade and fruit for the Freeman-Curry family and earlier for the Filer family for well over a century.

The trunk is 18 feet in circumference.

## **Notable Structures**

The Freeman-Curry House at 724 Eaton Street was built by banker Samuel Filer circa 1865 during the Civil War and sold in the early 1920s to Jenkins and Louise Curry, grandparents of the Freeman Curry Family. The house, which has been owned only by these two families, has been a center of community leadership, politics, and community service since Key West's early days. It may well be the oldest house in Key West still serving as a private full-time residence.

The Bahama House next door at 730 Eaton was built in the Bahamas and floated by barge to Key West in 1847. It sits on the other side of the Sapodilla tree and also enjoys its shade and fruit.

The Freeman Justice Center, (the Monroe County Court House), was named for the six members of the Freeman family who served in elected public office for a total of 104 years. Four of them, Jenkins Curry, William A, Freeman, Sr, William A. Freeman, Jr, and Shirley Freeman lived in the house in the shadow of the Sapodilla tree.

## **Notable Events**

Hurricanes have visited the Sapodilla tree many times but it has withstood them all including the 1919 Florida Keys Hurricane, the 1935 Labor Day Hurricane, Donna in 1960, Betsy in 1965, and Irma in 2017. The limbs of the tree have always been kept thinned out so the tree does not "sail" in high winds.

## Notable persons

Samuel Filer, a Key West banker, built the house at 724 Eaton Street in the early 1860s. Samuel's brother, William Filer, was a shipbuilder and operator of a fleet of merchant ships – probably a lucrative but dangerous enterprise during the Civil War. Samuel used his brother's ship carpenters to build the house with Dade County virgin pine. It is a sturdy structure - built like a ship. The house stayed in the Filer family for several generations until the early 1920s.

Commissioner Filer, a descent of Samuel and resident of the house, served as Monroe County Commissioner in the late 1800s.

Thomas Jenkins Curry who was born on Green Turtle Cay in the Bahamas came to the Florida Keys around 1912, settling first in Key Largo where he had a pineapple plantation where now sits the Freeman radio tower near the 100 mile-marker. In the early 1920s in Key West, he bought the 724 Eaton Street house from the Filer family, moved the

house 40 feet back from the street and completely renovated it adding indoor plumbing, electric lights, and a new kitchen attached to the house. He commissioned Cuban Artist Joaquin Barroso to paint murals of scenes from Jenkin's life on the walls of the ballroom in 1925.

In the 1940s Curry helped start the Florida Keys Electric Co-op that now provides electricity from the 7-mile bridge to the Florida mainland and was a member of the original Electric Co-op Board. He served on the Overseas Road and Toll Bridge Authority which acquired the right-away of Flagler's railroad after much of it was destroyed by the 1935 Labor Day Hurricane. It is now US-I. Curry served on the Monroe County Commission 1938-40.

Joaquin Barroso, the renowned Cuban Artist, was sent from Havana by the Cuban government to paint the wall murals and stage backdrops in the Cuban Consulate in Key West on Duval Street, now known as the San Carlos Institute. Barroso remained in Key West and has many descendants here.

**William A. Freeman, Sr**, known affectionately as Mr. Will, was first a banker, then an employee and later owner of Porter Allen Insurance.

Mr. Will served on the Key West City Council for from 1927 to 1945 and was instrumental in the city buying the existing private electric company and establishing the city-owned utility, City Electric (now renamed Keys Energy). The final deal was signed on the dining room table at 724 Eaton Street.

William A. Freeman, Jr, was born and died in the 724 Eaton Street house and lived most of his life there. He worked in the family business of Porter Allen Insurance and served as an elected official in the Florida Keys for 34 years – 20 years as County Commissioner, 2 years as State Representative, and 12 years as Sheriff of Monroe County. As commissioner he championed zoning, providing county court houses

and services in the middle and upper keys, and helped bring "sunshine" into the county commission meetings by refusing to attend private, back-room meetings of the commission. He saved the Pigeon Key buildings, built by Henry Flagler during the Seven Mile Railroad Bridge construction, from the wrecker's ball and becoming a Howard Johnson's motel site. As state representative he obtained the money to widen and rebuild the 34 bridges that connect the Keys. As sheriff, he put a big dent in drug traffic, cleaned up the derelict sheriff's department and brought it to national accreditation and uniform respect by other law enforcement agencies.

David Freeman, brother of William who also lived in the 724 Eaton Street house as a youngster, said the Sapodilla tree was huge when he played marbles under it in the 1930s. David owns and operates Porter Allen Insurance on Southard Street with his daughter Elizabeth Freeman Hale. Porter Allen, established in 1890, is the second oldest continuous business in Key West. (The Key West Citizen was established in 1879).


Shirley Freeman, widow of William A. Freeman, Jr, has been the care-taker of the Sapodilla tree for the 30 years since his death. She has continued to kept the limbs thinned so the wind can safely go through during a hurricane. From Arkansas, she is a retired school administrator, Monroe County Commission and Mayor. She helped shape the Rate of Growth Ordinance (ROGO) that limits development and building height in the Keys and was a founder of the Community Foundation of the Florida Keys.

#### Dear Karen:

We are submitting a Heritage Tree nomination for the sapodilla in our front yard ay724 Eaton Street and are trying to figure out how old it is.

My brother-in-law David Freeman remembers playing under the tree as a boy in the 1930s. It was a big tree then. The circumference of the trunk now is 18 feet. It is taller than the house which is three stories. The limbs have been thinned numerous times to prevent the tree from damaging the house during a hurricane. (The Conchs call this to prevent sailing.)

Do you have any suggestions to estimate its age? The house was built circa 1865. Thanks, Shirley Freeman

PS. Our baby breadfruit tree in the Truman Waterfront Park is doing well. Thanks for shepherding it.




