Hi Doug,

Thanks for the reply.

I don't believe Kenny's business is or can be a business with the current boat, even if repaired, regardless of the operator. Please see my thoughts below.

While the boat has a pleasing layout and size for guests, it burns an unsustainable amount of oil and gas both from a business and climate change perspective. I attribute this fuel cost as the main reason why Kenny's business failed. As he ran trips, he was unable to operate at margins that could allow him to properly maintain his boat, draining his resources until he couldn't financially survive the pandemic.


- The boat requires 500hp to push it through the water, this is an equivalent amount of HP to one of the Fury Corinthians that can carry 49 passengers. That amount of Horsepower burns upwards of 100 gallons a day. At today's fuel price of \$3.27/gallon this equals a fuel cost of \$327 and represents a minimum Cost of Goods Sold of 30% of Revenue, if assuming sold out trips. Over the seven years I have been in business my total Cost of Goods Sold has been under 30% (this includes payroll, commissions, fuel, ice etc..
- The boat is not historically significant, sounds like an attack helicopter, smells like a weedwacker, has no bathroom, and as the expense of repairing it would cost more than it's value, (and still not solve the main problem) I believe it should be considered "totaled".
- Climate Change this is just as important to me as financial reasons. I take guests to see coral and it is being devastated by increasing temperatures and ocean acidification from the burning of fossil fuels. My goal is to push eco-tourism towards sustainability, and reducing my carbon per passenger footprint, which is why I built the electric boat.

Realistically, I could not hope to operate the boat and it would be disingenuous of me to present otherwise. I don't believe it is feasible for anyone to keep the boat in service anymore than if it had sunk or caught fire.

The business would however stay the same in it's purpose in that it would continue to run ecotours and private charters and keep it's website and phone. The business was originally purchased by Kenny with a different boat in the slip and since 2005 there have been at least 4 different boats in that spot.
