





 - RFQ 25-001 Art in Public Places Administrative Services

Bids Broadcast, Opened, Awarded and Closed-

In January 2025, the City of Key West did not issue or open any bids for solicitation. However, during this period, the City did award a bid related to RFQ 25-001 for Art in Public Places (AIPP) Administrative Services. This award was approved by the City Commission through Resolution on January 7, 2025, and was granted to the Florida Keys Council of the Arts. The financial impact of this decision will result in an annual fee not to exceed \$15,000.00, which will be invoiced monthly based on the hours worked for the Board of Art in Public Places. Currently, the City is billed at a rate of \$42 per hour for the Executive Director's time and \$25–\$30 per hour for the Executive Director's Assistant.

Additional Information-

Although bid activity was slow in January, the Office of Procurement remained actively engaged in the development of a new City Ordinance for Public-Private Partnerships (P3). This ordinance was created in response to the recent passage of House Bill 781, which amends section 255.065, F.S. and introduces new statutory guidelines governing the use of Public-Private Partnerships in Florida. The purpose of the ordinance is to establish a structured framework for facilitating and managing P3 projects within the City, ensuring compliance with the new state law while fostering effective collaboration between the public and private sectors. This ordinance was approved in January 2025, with a secondary approval scheduled for March 2025.
