Cigar House - Tree Concerns



Hi Amy -

During the inspection of the Cigar House yesterday, I observed some concerning cracking in locations that suggest the large sapodilla tree is exerting forces onto the structure. Active and recurring cracks in the gable roof, several repaired cracks near the baseboards (opposite of the tree location), and large spalled concrete areas on the outer edge of the floor slab all indicate that the structure is potentially experiencing slight racking during wind events. In the racking image below, I am showing locations of the cracks in blue arrows. This gives a very rough visualization of how the tree pushing at the eave can create the observed crack patterns.



Whilte it is abolutely possible that they cracks could be due to other issues, such as poor drywall compound work, moisture, etc.., I think it's highly likely that the tree is the primary culprit. Unfortunately, I would recommend removal of the tree. If the tree is left in place, additionaly cracking and potentially further damage to the structure during wind events are very likely. I would also recommend future repair of the spalling (within the next year or so), as reinforcement bar corrosion will only worsen over time and drive repair costs up.

Amy,

I did not realize that THE CIGAR HOUSE IS ACTUALLY ON A CONCRETE SLAB. If this is true, it makes removing the tree both necessary and a problem.

You must remove the tree to prevent the roots and trunk from imposing on the slab foundation, but, once the tree is removed, the roots will slowly rot and allow the slab to sink and move as the portion currently supported by the root system slowly loses that support.

Do we have an estimate to remove the tree? I am afraid we may be looking at six figures since we will probably need a crane sitting on Eaton street it to

remove the largest portions. Expensive and a lot of hassle!
