It seems our city coffers are forever bailing out Commissioner Lissette Carey from her self-inflicted financial woes.

Prior to becoming a City Commissioner, the City had already forgiven her for the tens of thousands in completely waived liens on the property she obtained by means of a supposed “fundraiser.” One I had personally donated to.

The “fundraiser” in question was supposedly meant to help house a wounded veteran, but instead turned out to be a clever con that, in reality, only enriching her family and herself.

In order for her to dip into the public coffers once again—this time for reimbursement of her attorney’s fees in regard to a currently “moot” recall effort (moot not due to its substance but based on a technical deficiency)—however under Florida law Commissioner Carey must first demonstrate that she was “serving a public purpose” in performance of her public duties.

A review of the Grand Jury Report, accompanied by the several inconsistent interviews provided by Commissioner Carey herself, clearly demonstrates that she was not performing a “public service” but just the opposite, as she illegally conspired with Mayor Denise Henriques, Commissioner Donnie Lee, and former criminally indicted City Attorney Ron Ramsingh, as well as a host of others, to suppress the Corradino Report, which in turn led to the wrongful termination of former City Manager Al Childress.

The Grand Jury Report (per pages 18–19—recommendation #7 therein) went on to unanimously recommend that Commissioner Carey resign her post for her actions and various inactions in this regard, as well as for failing to understand and perform her elected duties.

It is one thing to have a disagreement over an issue or policy concerning city governance; it is quite another to illegally conspire with the former City Attorney, Ron Ramsingh, and actually sponsor a resolution to suppress the independent Corradino Report.

This report in question cost the City \$50,000. The report was never read by Commissioner Carey. Its contents, however, laid bare some of the irregularities taking place within the Building Department, which led to 21 criminal felony indictments of high-ranking City officials—and counting.

If this resolution is passed, it will be further proof-positive evidence that the “Bubba System,” or a variation thereof, as referred to in the Grand Jury Report, is still alive and thriving at City Hall.

It is for all the above reasons that I therefore adamantly oppose this resolution. It is wrong in both fact and law and, more importantly, flies in the face of good, principled, and responsible city governance.
