Original Narrative By Jhavon Williams, 04/10/26 03:51

On March 10, 2026, at approximately 0051 hours, I, Ofc. J. Williams, was on routine patrol in the area of Duval Street and Caroline Street when I observed a black Mazda CX-1 fail to come to a complete stop at the stop bar at the intersection of Caroline Street and Whitehead Street.

I conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle and made contact with the driver, later identified as Jennifer Lynn Reinert (DOB: 03/01/1980), who was identified via passport.

Upon my initial contact from the passenger-side approach, I detected a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from the interior of the vehicle and from the driver's person.

I requested her driver's license, registration, and proof of insurance. Reinert advised that the vehicle was a rental and stated her wallet had been stolen a few days prior, and that she only had her passport in her possession.

It should also be noted that I had prior contact with this same vehicle in reference to a parking violation. During that incident, Ofc. Anderson and I observed an open container of an alcoholic beverage inside the vehicle.

I then re-approached the driver from the driver's side to continue my investigation. Upon contact, I again detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from her breath.

Based on my observations, I asked Reinert if she would be willing to perform standardized field sobriety exercises to ensure she was not impaired. Reinert agreed.

During the exercises, I observed multiple indicators of impairment, including glossy eyes, lack of smooth pursuit, and clues of impairment during the walk-and-turn and one-leg stand tests. During the eye examination, I observed a lack of smooth pursuit. As her eyes tracked to the left, they exhibited distinct jerking movements approximately two to three times. Similarly, as her eyes tracked to the right, they again displayed two to three noticeable jerks.

During the walk-and-turn exercise, the subject was unable to follow instructions. She repeatedly failed to maintain her position as directed, including not keeping her hands at her sides and not maintaining heel-to-toe contact along the line, she continued to step off the line and did not comply with the exercise requirements.

During the One-Leg Stand exercise, the subject was unable to successfully complete the task. The subject repeatedly placed her foot on the ground and was unable to maintain balance for the duration of the exercise.

Based on the totality of the circumstances, I developed probable cause to believe Reinert was operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of an alcoholic beverage.

Reinert was placed under arrest for Driving Under the Influence 316.193-1.

Reinert was transported to the Monroe County Detention Center. At the detention center, Ofc. Lashley conducted a 20-minute observation period and administered a breath test (BTO), which resulted in readings of .00,.

However, it should be noted that after the breath test was conducted, a urine sample was obtained. The nurse subsequently disposed of the first urine sample by flushing it down the toilet. After the subject provided a breath sample of .00, I requested a second urine sample due to my suspicion that she may have been under the influence of narcotics and/or prescription medication, based on observed signs of impairment. A urine sample was subsequently obtained, properly packaged, and will be submitted to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) for analysis.

I learned that Reinert's driver's license is valid. However, her license carries a restriction prohibiting the operation of a motor vehicle with a blood alcohol level of 0.02 or higher. The records check also indicated that Reinert has five prior OWI convictions.

Prior to transport, Reinert was searched by Ofc. Harris. She was transported without incident.

I verbally explained the citation to Reinert and advised her that signing the citation is not an admission of guilt. Reinert acknowledged and signed the citation 316.193-1. During my investigation, Reinert admitted to having an open container in the vehicle and stated she had consumed one alcoholic beverage while in the downtown area.

There were no Drug Recognition Experts (DREs) available on duty during my shift; therefore, I was unable to request a DRE response during the course of the investigation.

My body-worn camera and in-car camera were activated throughout the duration of this investigation.

Supplemental Narrative By Johnasia Harris, 04/10/26 02:26

On 04/10/2026 at approximately 0052 hours, I, Ofc. J. Harris, responded to the area of Whitehead Street and Eaton Street in reference to a traffic stop.

Upon arrival, I made contact with the driver and observed the standardized field sobriety tasks being conducted. I also ensured scene safety during the exercises.

Following the investigation, I conducted an inventory search of the vehicle and completed a tow slip. I remained on scene until the arrival of Arnold's Towing, at which time the vehicle was released to the tow company.

I then relocated to the jail, where I turned over the arrestee's property to Ofc. J. Williams, the primary officer of the case.

My body-worn camera (BWC) was activated throughout the duration of this investigation. All evidence was uploaded to Axon.com.

Nothing further to report at this time.

Supplemental Narrative By Adam Lashley, 04/10/26 02:40

On Friday 04/10/2026 at approximately 0132 hours, I (Ofc. Lashley) arrived at the Monroe County Detention Center to meet with Ofc. J. Williams regarding his arrestee. Upon arrival, I identified the subject as Jennifer Lynn Reinert.

I (Ofc. Lashley) am a certified Breath Test Operator in the State of Florida and possess a valid, in-date permit to administer such tests. The instrument used was the Intoxilyzer 8000, S/N 80-000867. I began the required twenty (20) minute observation period at 0145 hours. During the observation period, Reinert did not take anything orally, did not regurgitate, and did not touch her mouth. I did not leave the BTO room at any time during the observation period, nor did I turn my back to Reinert

After completing the 20-minute observation, I requested that Reinert submit to a lawful test of her breath, and she agreed. Reinert provided the following samples:

Subject Sample #1: 0.000 Time: 02:11
Subject Sample #2: 0.000 Time: 02:13

I informed Reinert of the results of the breath test. I then turned custody of Reinert back to Ofc. Williams for processing.

Please reference Ofc. Williams report for probable cause. My Axon body-worn camera was active during the 20-minute observation period and while collecting the BTO results.
