About the Council

As the designated Local Arts Agency by Florida Statute #265.32, we are committed to our leadership role as the community's umbrella organization for arts and culture.

The Florida Keys Council of the Arts is the leading arts and cultural organization in the Florida Keys.

The Arts Council provides services and grants to visual and performing artists, arts organizations, students, and the public, striving to instill a passion for and participation in the arts. To enrich and enhance the arts and cultural community, the Arts Council promotes the Art in Public Places program, and advances the destination for its rich and diverse history.

The cultural arts play a fundamental role in the lives of our residents and visitors. The Arts have been and continue to be the signature of what makes our community unique and an international destination.

Our focus is to maintain and expand our programming in a diverse, innovative

and balanced manner. We strive for results that strengthen the economy, promote active community engagement, and provide support for arts education and advocacy.

Outreach and advocacy are ongoing activities. We connect the public to a sense of place and community with the Art in Public Places commissioned permanent art collection. We advocate in a leadership role by gaining knowledge through our participation in Americans for the Arts, Florida Association of Local Arts Agencies (FALAA), and Florida

to public art trends, challenges and best practices. Arts Council's Board Members and Advisors are engaged, educated and passionate ambassadors for all of the arts. Their commitment to the organization and knowledge of the economic impact of the arts within the County is essential to our advocacy efforts for continued growth and relevance.

WE SUPPORT: To date, \$531,281 has been directly awarded in local grants. This fiscal year we awarded \$42,650 in grants to teaching artists and served over 6,500 children. In addition thousands of artists and audiences were also served in Monroe County. These grants are funded in part by the State of Florida, Monroe County Board of County Commissioners, membership dues and private donations.

WE CONNECT: We focus on connecting the community to the arts. Our ambitious season of events raises both awareness and funds for our grant programs throughout the Florida Keys. Expanded and refined programming included: The Connections Project: A Mosaic of the Keys, Culture Circle Series and the Symphony in the Schools program.

WE PROMOTE: As the main source of information promoting arts and culture in the Keys, our annual Gallery Guide, Culture Magazine and the KeysArts Quarterly events calendar (produced in cooperation with the Monroe County Tourist Development Council) are distributed at almost 200 Keys' locations, included in national and international press kits and distributed at travel trade shows. To promote our local artists we create rotating exhibits for our program, Art in Public Buildings. We are also proud to administer Monroe County's prestigious 1% for Public Art program.

WE GIVE: Through the Cultural Umbrella, South Florida Cultural Consortium Fellowship Award, Art in Public Places commissions and the total distributed through the Art Council's efforts; total funds distributed in the Keys' cultural community comes to over \$7.52 million to date. The annual economic impact of the non-profit arts community in Monroe County is estimated at over \$86 million.

A Message from our Executive Director Elizabeth Young

Our 2015-2016 season was an ambitious series of events throughout the Keys to raise awareness, and funds for our grant programs. We kicked off with a Board and Advisor orientation, grant panels for Artists in Schools, ArtReach and Special Projects, and I was honored to be a State Cultural Division Grant panelist. We held our 2nd annual *Culture Crawl* event to promote cultural venues within Key West's historic district with business sponsor, Hard Rock Café. Highlights include free application workshops on The Art of Public Art, SFCC \$15,000 Fellowship, Knight Foundation Arts Challenge, Cultural Umbrella Event funding and our new initiative, a Speakers' Bureau in Key Largo and Marathon. Terri and I presented to the Leadership Monroe class on the arts and its positive economic impact in the

County. Our members' exhibit in November at the Gato was themed, *Changing Tides*, and reflected on the ebb and flow of the water, sky and island living challenges and joys. The holiday membership party in the exquisite home of Larry and Carol Abramovitz, celebrated the opening of season with Bobby Nesbitt and Carmen Rodriguez entertaining over 200 guests. We showcased outstanding local artists whose work is in the hosts' collection. The membership campaign expanded to the Middle and Upper Keys, with a second holiday event at the *Bait Shack*, the magnificent Marathon estate of arts patrons, Steve and Sheila Cook, we are grateful for their support. Our ambitious project connecting Keys' artists, *The Connections Project: A Mosaic of the Keys* was held for the 4th season and created more enthusiasm and participation. We thank our generous business sponsor, *Royal Furniture* for its assistance in moving, hosting receptions and funding! In 2016, our Advocate level members were offered five sessions for the popular, *Culture Circle Series*. Grateful thanks



to our series hosts, Bill and MaryCarlin Porter. February in the Gato Gallery brought bright and textured artwork in for our exhibit: *Fauna, Fiber and Fruit* curated by staff member Reen Stanhouse and Board member, Susann D'Antonio.

In February, 2,000 elementary students attended the South Florida Symphony Orchestra sponsored by the Arts Council and Monroe County School District. Continuing on last year's success, we partnered with the Waterfront Playhouse to bring 150 KWHS

students to the musical, *The Producers*. The State of the Arts annual meeting with guest speaker, Representative Holly Raschein, shared arts advocacy and the Council's role. April was busy with our strategic planning board retreat, and we wrapped up the season in June with a photography exhibit sponsored by the Waypoint Foundation featuring 1968 Vietnam images by Glenn Hoover – his glimpse of life as a soldier on duty.

Looking towards the next 20 years, I know it will be most exciting and rewarding – just picture our proposed new sculpture trail along US 1 with work from the Art Students League of New York and the Keys. I can hear in my mind, Cris Sandifer and Connie Gilbert raving about the concept and offering to curate for us! We will miss these amazing women and their steadfast support of all the arts, all the keys, all the time.

Finally, we were very honored to have our agreement with the Board of County Commissioners as the designated Local Arts Agency renewed until October 2031, with a 15 year option to renew! What a wonderful testament to the importance of the Arts enriching our lives.

I am so proud to work each day with our devoted Board Members, Advisors and artists. And I am extremely grateful for the daily support, hard work and friendship of my colleagues, Martha Resk and Coco Page. And to Reen Stanhouse – thank you for always being there and figuring it out on behalf of the Council. Last but not least, as I enter my 10th year as E.D., I give heartfelt thanks to my family for their love and encouragement.

Our mission to enrich our community with the arts compels us to focus daily on supporting, connecting, promoting and giving.

Ganine Giorgione Derleth, Vice Chair



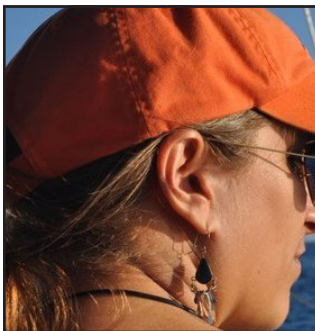

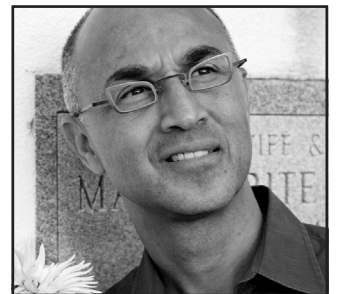
M. Ann Lynch

ARTISTS IN SCHOOLS GRANTS AWARDED:

SOUTH FLORIDA CULTURAL CONSORTIUM FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

The SFCC Fellowship Program offers the largest regional, government-sponsored artists' grants in the US, awarding \$15,000 and \$7,500 fellowships to resident visual and media artists from Broward, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe and Palm Beach counties. In 2016, Key West's Deborah Goldman was awarded \$15,000.

The Connections Project: A Mosaic of the Keys

The Connections Project, the Florida Keys Council of the Arts' moveable feast continues to amuse, entertain and inspire us with its colorful ideas, all on little squares.

The Arts Council's 5th annual Connections Project - Mosaic of the Keys, provides 400 free 6 x 6 inch blank canvases for Monroe County artists and community members to create their own unique piece of art. We offer free workshops throughout the Keys to assist those that may need guidance and materials.

We then collect, assemble and exhibit the 400 canvases as one large mosaic. Each year, we travel to six Keys' locations

and celebrate at each venue with an opening reception.

Each May, we disassemble the mosaic and each canvas is shipped to our eagerly awaiting collectors. For a \$35 or \$100 donation you too can join the Connections Project and receive one or three of these masterpieces to start or add to your own collection.

We are grateful to our Business Partner, Royal Furniture, for its continued support.

The project raises awareness for the Council, as it connects artists to one another. The work is outstanding and reflects the beauty and uniqueness of the Keys.

Art in Public Places

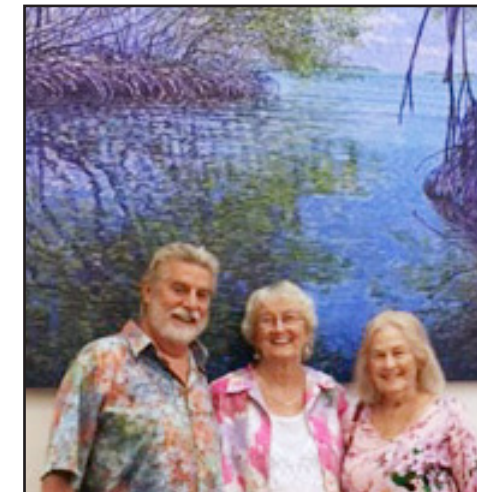

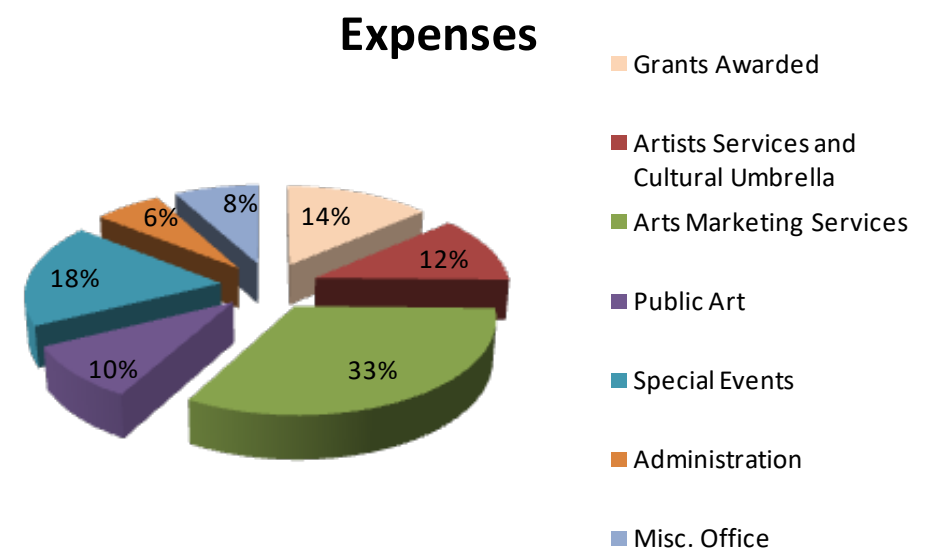
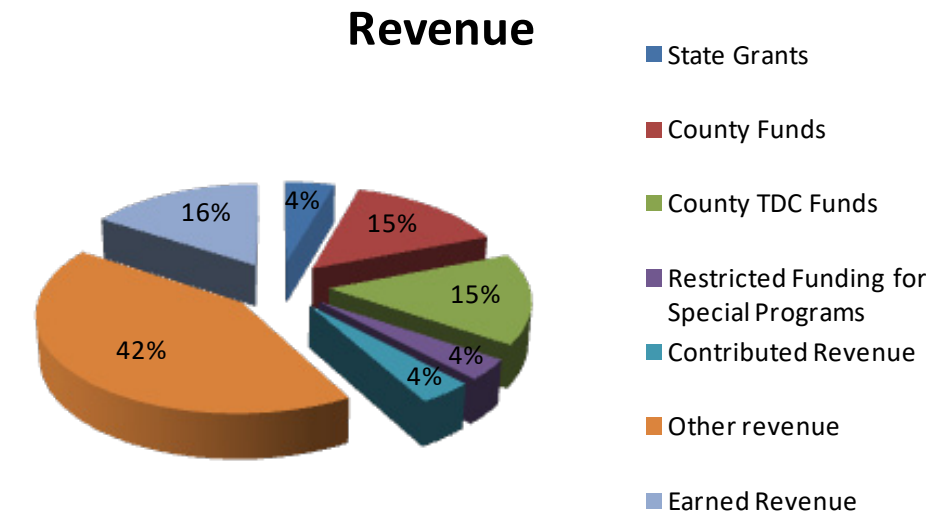
Financial Statement at a Glance

The Arts Council is governed by Sunshine Laws and conducts all business in public. Accounting and reporting procedures are transparent and readily tracked. Staff provides financial reports to the Board monthly. A financial audit is prepared annually by an independent auditor, and is available on our website.

The cultural tourist serves as a primary illustration of the arts economic impact on area businesses. The most recent Americans for the Arts economic survey (completed in 2009, and to be updated in 2017) shows in Monroe County:

- The Arts represent an \$86.9+ million industry;
- The Arts support 1,764 full-time equivalent jobs;
- The Arts are important to 47% of our target travelers when choosing a vacation destination and,
- The Arts generate \$9.9 million in local/state government revenue.

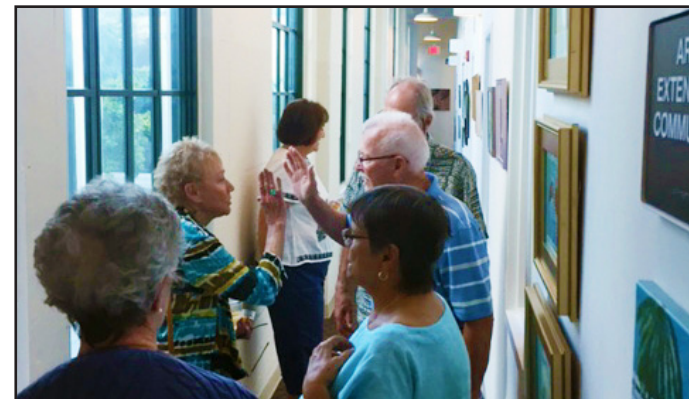
