A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF KEY WEST, FLORIDA, RATIFYING THE ATTACHED "ADDENDUM TO MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF KEY WEST AND UNITED WAY OF COLLIER AND THE INC." (MOU); RATIFYING A FINAL EMERGENCY EXPENDITURE TOTALING \$58,561.58 TO THE UNITED WAY OF COLLIER AND THE KEYS (UWCK) FOR COMMUNITY RENTAL ASSISTANCE; RATIFYING FINAL PAYMENT TO FLORIDA KEYS AREA HEALTH EDUCATION CENTER (AHEC) TOTALLING 90,299.72 FOR COVID-19 RAPID TESTING PURSUANT TO THE MOU, THE COVID-19 SUPPORT "STOP-GAP MEASURE PROPOSAL", AND PURSUANT TO SECTION 2-CODE OF ORDINANCES; 797(2) OF THE ANY NECESSARY BUDGET AUTHORIZING TRANSFERS AND ADJUSTMENTS; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, on March 1, 2020, the Governor of Florida, Ron DeSantis, issued Executive Order Number 20-51, directing the State Health Officer and Surgeon General to declare a Public Health Emergency due to the discovery of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) in Florida; and

WHEREAS, in response to the COVID-19 threat, the City declared a State of Local Emergency on March 15, 2020 in accordance with F.S. 252.38 and CKW Resolution 2007-182. The State of Local Emergency has been repeatedly extended; and

WHEREAS, at its meeting of January 5, 2021, the City Commission considered a "Stop-Gap Measure Support Proposal," and via voice consensus, granted the City Manager the

authority to expend up to \$500,000 of the City of Key West General Fund unrestricted fund balance for specific community support services outlined in the proposal; and

WHEREAS, the City and UWCK mutually agreed to a Memorandum of Understanding setting forth specific terms related to the distribution of funds, and through Resolutions 21-017 and 21-055 certain payments have been authorized and paid pursuant to the MOU; and

WHEREAS, an Addendum to the Memorandum of Understanding is necessary to increase the City of Key West funds by \$37,561.58 for providing rent, food, medical, utilities and basic needs for Key West residents and workers experiencing hardships due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager acted without delay, using emergency powers authorized under Section 2-797(2) of the City's Code of Ordinances, to execute an Addendum to the Memorandum of Understanding, and to issue final payments to UWCK and AHEC for certain essential needs programs that serve local citizens; and

WHEREAS, Section 2-797(2) of the City's Code of Ordinances requires the City Commission to ratify such emergency purchases at its next scheduled meeting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF KEY WEST, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That the attached "Addendum -- Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Key West and United Way of Collier and the Keys, Inc." (MOU) is hereby ratified to authorize additional City funding in the amount of \$37,561.58.

Section 2: That the emergency expenditures totaling \$58,561.58 to UWCK, pursuant to the MOU, the Stop-Gap Measure Covid-19 Support Proposal, and pursuant to section 2-797(2) of the Code of Ordinances, are hereby ratified.

Section 3: That the emergency expenditure totaling \$90,299.72 to Keys AHEC, pursuant to the MOU, the Stop-Gap Measure Covid-19 Support Proposal, and pursuant to section 2-797(2) of the Code of Ordinances, is hereby ratified.

Section 4: That any necessary budget transfers and adjustments, to effectuate the expenditure of the City of Key West General Fund unrestricted fund balance for the specific community support services outlined in the Proposal, are hereby authorized.

Section 5: That City staff is directed to continue to work closely with local non-profits providing food, health

care and housing assistance to the citizens of Key West, to ensure funds are used effectively to meet current needs.

Section 6: That this Resolution shall go into effect immediately upon its passage and adoption and authentication by the signature of the Presiding Officer and the Clerk of the Commission.

#### **ACTION STATEMENT:**

Ratification of the attached Addendum to the Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Key West and United Way of Collier and the Keys, Inc. (MOU); Ratification of Final Payments totaling \$90,299.72 to Florida Keys Area Health Education Center (AHEC) for COVID-19 rapid testing and \$58,561.58 to United Way of Collier and the Keys (UWCK) for Community rental assistance pursuant to the AHEC & UWCK MOU's, the "Stop-Gap Measure COVID-19 Support Proposal", and pursuant to Section 2-797 (2) of the Code of Ordinances and granting the City Manager the authority to effectuate necessary budget amendment(s) for this purpose.

#### JUSTIFICATION AND NEED:

The following excerpt is taken from the Stop-Gap Measure COVID-19 Support Proposal:

While there is finally an end in sight to the pandemic, the immediate future remains bleak. As we await the vaccine and the next round of federal aid, our Island's safety nets run thin. The virus still rages, and rapid testing Is both limited and expensive. Many frontline employees are forced to pay out of pocket to get quick results. Some avoid getting tested altogether. The CARES Act funds took approximately 10 weeks to reach Monroe County after they were approved, and longer to reach community members. If a similar trend ensues for the most recently approved funds, there is an urgent need to fill the gap between now and that time.

There is little help left in our community to meet our residents' basic needs. Our nonprofit organizations have exhausted most of their funds and cannot provide for much longer at this current rate, without additional support. A recent survey conducted by United Way in December 2020 of 13 nonprofit organizations in Key West, (attached), shows a gap in funds to assist residents with rent, food, utilities, medical and other essential needs.

The lack of basic provisions adds to the spread of the virus. When employees can't pay their rent or put food on the table, they are dissuaded from quarantining. There are not sufficient support systems in place to help them, and much of the workforce simply can't afford to lose more income.

Key to the Caribbean - Average yearly temperature 77° F.

The spike in COVID cases, combined with the lapse in funding and protective measures like the eviction moratorium could lead Key West into a tail spin in the coming months. If ever there were a moment to step in and fill the gap, that time is now.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Health and Business Advisory Committee, the Key West Chamber of Commerce and the Nonprofit Community of Key West, and their Inter-Ministerial Alliance joined in December 2020 to identify measures that would assist the community through the first quarter of 2021. The result was a five-part plan presented to the City Commission on January 5, 2021. Two parts of the proposal required a commitment of City of Key West Funding, \$171,250 for a Free Rapid Testing program administered by AHEC and \$262,500 for community emergency assistance for rent, food, utilities and medical and essential needs, to be administered by United Way of Collier and the Keys. Details of each of these two proposal parts can be found in the Stop-Gap Measure COVID-19 Support Proposal, Resolution 21-017.

An Addendum to increase City of Key West funds by an additional \$37,561.58 is needed for providing rent, food, medical, utilities and basic needs for City of Key West residents and workers experiencing hardships due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT:

At the January 5, 2021 City Commission Meeting the Proposal for a Stop-Gap Measure for COVID Support to the City of Key West was presented. The City Commission granted via voice consensus the City Manager authority to expend up to \$500,000 of City of Key West General Fund unrestricted fund balance for those specific community support services outlined in the Proposal. The City Commission ratified payment to UWCK in an amount of \$132,186 under Resolution 21-017. Payments to UWCK in the amount of \$109,334 to UWCK and \$67,661.26 to AHEC were ratified under Resolution 21-055. Final payment ratification is requested under this resolution to AHEC in an amount of \$90,299.72 as well as final payment ratification to UWCK in an amount of \$58,561.58, as described in the summaries below:

## MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF KEY WEST AND FLORIDA KEYS AREA HEALTH EDUCATION CENTER, INC., DATED JANUARY 11, 2021

#### PURPOSE

This Memorandum of Understanding (hereafter MOU) is made and entered into by and between The City of Key West (hereafter CITY) and the Florida Keys Area Health Education Center, Inc. (hereafter AHEC). By this MOU, the City and AHEC agree to terms and conditions related to disbursement and utilization of \$171.250.00 of City of Key West funds for providing free rapid testing and follow up PCR testing to community members via static and mobile testing sites, per the requirements below and the Proposal for a Stop-Gap Measure for COVID Support, submitted and presented to the City of Key West City Commission on January 5, 2021.

#### II. AUTHORITY

CITY may, by agreement and operation of law, charge persons or groups with duties incident to the protection of life and property within the County during an emergency. This agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida.

#### III. RECITALS

WHEREAS, CITY has statutory responsibility to prevent, minimize, and repair injury and damage resulting from any type of disaster, and;

WHEREAS, the Florida Keys Area Health Education Center, Inc., effectively promote health and wellness through education, health assessments, and professional development using partnerships and other contract-funded services, resulting in a healthier, better educated community. Residents and workers requiring supportive services in the form of testing are reluctant to get tested for fear of losing income, and;

WHEREAS, CITY understands it is in the best interest of the residents and workers of Key West to enter into an agreement with AHEC for the deployment of static and mobile testing sites that will be available to residents of Key West, Stock Island and Key Haven, and for employees who work in Key West who can provide proof of residence and/or employment to receive the test at no cost.

#### IV. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

- A. Parties: The Parties to the MOU are:
  - 1. Florida Keys Area Health Education Center, Inc.
  - 2. The City of Key West
- B. Term: The agreement is effective as of January 11, 2021 and shall remain in effect until April 11, 2021 (90 Days).
- C. Terms and Conditions:
  - 1. AHEC will:
    - A. Commit to using the funds from City for the program and related goals solely to provide free rapid testing and follow up PCR testing to mitigate the effects of COVID-19 for qualified Key West residents and workers and no other related activity or expense. Funds should be exhausted by April 11, 2021. In the event of unforeseen circumstances, any unused funds must be acknowledged to City for reimbursement, extension of time or approval of alternate use.
    - B. Provide City with a report on funding expenditures by April 30, 2021. The report will include:
      - 1. Accounting of how all dollars are spent
      - Accounting of number of individuals/families and workers served, and services provided
      - 3. Demographic information on individuals/families and workers served, including age, employment, and geographic area
      - Description of how funds aided in relief efforts for affected residents and workers, including specific stories and photos (if available)
      - Acknowledgement of how funding was recognized via a press release, social media, or other outreach effort.
    - C. Include either the City of Key West logo and/or mention of our funding in any media stories, advertisements/flyers or press releases related to the program, and any activities that are being funded by City

#### 2. CITY will:

A. Review all request for reimbursement and supporting documentation submitted from AHEC for completeness and accuracy before reimbursing AHEC.

- B. City will reimburse AHEC in an expedited manner but in no case more than 7 days after a City reviewed and accepted request is received.
- C. Share information with AHEC.
- D. Include AHEC and partner agencies in all public information pieces, media stories, advertisements/flyers, and press releases where applicable.

#### V. INDEMNIFICATION AND LIABILITIES

- A HEC shall be solely responsible to parties with whom it shall deal in carrying out the terms of this agreement and shall save the CITY harmless against all claims of whatever nature by third parties arising out of the performance of work under this agreement. For purposes of this agreement, AHEC agrees that it is not an employee or agent of the CITY, but it is an independent 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization and as such must abide by strict Federal regulations that govern the handling and accountability for all transferred funds.
- B. To the extent authorized by law, the City of Key West hereby agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Florida Keys Area Health Education Center from any and all loss, damage, liability, or expense in connection with any action, proceeding, or claim for injury, including death to any person or persons, or damage to, loss of the use of, or loss of tangible property of any person, firm, or corporation, including the parties hereto, arising or resulting out of the performance of this contract, but only to the extent caused or incurred by the negligence or other actionable fault of the City of Key West or its agent. This obligation shall be limited to a maximum amount of the sovereign immunity limits of liability prescribed in 768.28, Florida Statutes, namely \$200,000 per person or \$300,000 per occurrence, and the City of Key West will have no further obligation to defend or hold harmless the Florida Keys Area Health Education Center in the event said limits are paid or are otherwise exhausted. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to alter or waive the City's sovereign immunity under 768.28, Florida Statutes. Florida Keys Area Health Education Center acknowledges that indemnification by the City of Key West may be unenforceable under Florida law, and that the City of Key West does not waive any legal defense based on the unenforceability of such indemnification position.
- C. CITY recognizes that AHEC, its staff and volunteers are not employees or agents of the CITY in any form and that they maintain their own system of management and personnel policies.

- D. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any party or recipient to whom sovereign immunity applies. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a CITY agency or subdivision of CITY to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of any contract.
- E. AHEC agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold free and harmless, the CITY and each of its members, agents, servants, employees, officers, and directors, from and against any and all actions, claims, liabilities, assertions, of liability, losses, costs, and expenses including, but not limited to, attorney fees, reasonable investigative and discovery costs, and court costs, which in any manner may arise or be alleged to have arisen, or resulted, or alleged to have resulted, from the presence and activities. or any nature of otherwise of indemnify, defend, and hold free and harmless, the CITY and each of its members, agents, servants, employees, officers, and directors, from and against any and all actions, claims, liabilities, assertions, of liability, losses, costs, and expenses including, but not limited to, attorney fees, reasonable investigative and discovery costs, and court costs, which in any manner may arise or be alleged to have arisen, or resulted, or alleged to have resulted, from the presence and activities, or any nature of otherwise of AHBC its agents, servants, or employees relating to this MOU, including but not limited to, claim or claims for bodily injury or death of persons, and for loss of or damage to property, including claims or loss by CITY or its agents, servants, and employees.
- Subject to the limitations of Section 768.26 Florida Statutes, CITY agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold free and harmless to the extent permitted by law, AHEC and each of its volunteers, members, agents, servants, employees, officers, and directors from and against any and all actions, claims, liabilities, assertion of liability, losses, costs, and expenses including, but not limited to, attorney fees, reasonable investigative and discovery costs, and court costs, which in any manner may arise or be alleged to have arisen, or resulted, or alleged to have resulted, from the presence and activities, or any nature or otherwise of the CITY or employees relating to this MOU, including but not limited to claims for bodily injury or death of persons, and for loss of or damage to property, including claims or loss by the city or its agents, servants, and employees. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as a waiver of the City's Sovereign Immunity Limits.

#### VI. FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS

Federal regulations apply to all of the CITY of Key West contracts using Federal funds as a source for the solicitation of goods and services. In addition to the terms of Appendix II to 2 C.F.R. Part 200, which are attached as Exhibit A and incorporated herein, the following Federal requirements also apply to this Emergency Agreement:

- A. ACCESS BY THE GRANTEE, SUBGRANTEE, FEDERAL GRANTOR AGENCY AND COMPTROLLER GENERAL: AHEC shall allow access by the grantee, sub-grantee, Federal grantor agency and Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their duly authorized representatives to any books, documents, papers, and records of AHEC which are directly pertinent to that specific contract for the purpose of making audit, examination, excerpts and transcriptions.
- B. COPYRIGHTS The Grantee is free to copyright original work developed in the course of or under the agreement. FEMA reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use the work for Government purposes. Publication resulting from work performed under this agreement shall include an acknowledgement of FEMA financial support, by granted number, and a statement that the publication does not constitute an endorsement by FEMA or reflect FEMA views.
- C. DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (DBE) Contractors: AHEC agrees to ensure that Disadvantage Business Enterprises as defined in 49 C.F.R. Part 23, as amended, have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts and this agreement. In this regard, AHEC shall take all necessary and reasonable steps in accordance with 49 C.F.R. Part 23, as amended, to ensure that the Disadvantaged Business Enterprises have the maximum opportunity to compete for and perform contracts. AHEC shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of federal assisted contracts.
- D. ENERGY POLICY AND CONSERVATION ACT: AHEC shall comply with mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency which are contained in the state energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act (Pub. L. 94-163).
- E. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY: During the performance of this contract, AHEC agrees as follows:
  - AHEC will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of
    race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. AHEC will take affirmative action to ensure
    that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without
    regard to their race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Such action shall include, but
    not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment
    or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of
    compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. AHEC agrees to post in
    conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be
    provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
  - AHEC will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of AHEC, state that all qualified applicants will receive considerations for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.

- 3. AHEC will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representatives of AHEC 's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- AHEC will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- 5. The AHEC will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- 6. In the event of AHEC 's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the AHEC may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions as may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- AHEC will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each partner of AHEC or vendor. AHEC will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance: Provided however, in the event AHEC becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a partner of AHEC or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency AHEC may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

#### 8. AHEC shall:

- Place qualified small and minority businesses and women's business enterprises on solicitation lists.

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF KEY WEST AND UNITED WAY OF COLLIER AND THE KEYS, INC., DATED JANUARY 11, 2021

#### I. PURPOSE

This Memorandum of Understanding (hereafter MOU) is made and entered into by and between The City of Key West (hereafter CITY) and the United Way of Collier and the Keys, Inc. (hereafter UWCK). By this MOU, the City and UWCK agree to terms and conditions related to disbursement and utilization of \$262,520 of City of Key West funds for providing rent, food, medical, utilities and basic needs for City of Key West residents and workers experiencing hardships due to the COVID-19 pandemic, per the requirements below and the Proposal for a Stop-Gap Measure for COVID Support, submitted and presented to the City of Key West City Commission on January 5, 2021.

#### II. AUTHORITY

CITY may, by agreement and operation of law, charge persons or groups with duties incident to the protection of life and property within the County during an emergency. This agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida.

#### III. RECITALS

WHEREAS, CITY has statutory responsibility to prevent, minimize, and repair injury and damage resulting from anytype of disaster, and;

WHEREAS, the United Way of Collier and the Keys, Inc., advocates directly, and through its partners, for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, and Employed (ALICE) Key West residents and workers requiring supportive services in the form of rent, food, utilities, medical assistance and other essential needs related to the economic hardships of the COVID-19 pandemic, and;

WHEREAS, CITY understands it is in the best interest of the residents, workers, and visitors of Key West to enter into an agreement with UWCK for the management, validation of need and distribution of funds for those qualified applicants.

#### IV. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

- A. Parties: The Parties to the MOU are:
  - 1. The United Way of Collier and the Keys, Inc.
  - 2. The City of Key West
- B. Term: The agreement is effective as of January 11, 2021 and shall remain in effect until March 31, 2021.
- C. Terms and Conditions:
  - 1. UWCK will:
    - A. Commit to using the funds from City for the program and related goals solely to mitigate the effects of COVID-19 for qualified Key West residents and workers and no other related activity or expense. Funds should be exhausted by March 31, 2021. In the event of unforeseen circumstances, any unused funds must be acknowledged to City for reimbursement, extension of time or approval of alternate use.
    - B. Provide City with a report on funding expenditures by April 30, 2021. The report will include:
      - 1. Accounting of how all dollars are spent
      - 2. Accounting of number of unduplicated individuals/families and workers served and services provided
      - Demographic information on individuals/families and workers served, including gender, race/ethnicity, age, documented COVID hardship, employment, and geographic area
      - 4. Description of how funds aided in relief efforts for affected residents and workers, including specific stories and photos (if available)
      - 5. Acknowledgement of how funding was recognized via a press release, social media or other outreach effort.
    - C. Include either the City of Key West logo and/or mention of our funding in any media stories, advertisements/flyers or press releases related to the program, and any activities that are being funded by City.

#### 2. CITY will:

- A. Review all request for reimbursement and supporting documentation submitted from UWCK for completeness and accuracy before reimbursing UWCK
- B. City will reimburse UWCK in an expedited manner but in no case more than 7 days after a City reviewed and accepted request is received.

- C. Share information with UWCK
- D. Include UWCK and partner agencies in all public information pieces, media stories, advertisements/flyers and press releases where applicable

#### V. INDEMNIFICATION AND LIABILITIES

- A. UWCK shall be solely responsible to parties with whom it shall deal in carrying out the terms of this agreement and shall save the CITY harmless against all claims of whatever nature by third parties arising out of the performance of work under this agreement. For purposes of this agreement, UWCK agree that it is not an employee or agent of the CITY, but it is an independent 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization and as such must abide by strict Federal regulations that govern the handling and accountability for all transferred funds.
- B. To the extent authorized by law, the City of Key West hereby agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the United Way of Collier and the Keys from any and all loss, damage, liability, or expense in connection with any action, proceeding, or claim for injury, including death to any person or persons, or damage to, loss of the use of, or loss of tangible property of any person, firm, or corporation, including the parties hereto, arising or resulting out of the performance of this contract, but only to the extent caused or incurred by the negligence or other actionable fault of the City of Key West or its agent. This obligation shall be limited to a maximum amount of the sovereign immunity limits of liability prescribed in 768.28, Florida Statutes, namely \$200,000 per person or \$300,000 per occurrence, and the City of Key West will have no further obligation to defend or hold harmless the United Way of Collier and the Keys in the event said limits are paid or are otherwise exhausted. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to alter or waive the City's sovereign immunity under 768.28, Florida Statutes.

United Way of Collier and the Keys acknowledges that indemnification by the City of Key West may be unenforceable under Florida law, and that the City of Key West does not waive any legal defense based on the unenforceability of such indemnification position.

- C. CITY recognizes that UWCK, its staff and volunteers are not employees or agents of the CITY in any form and that they maintain their own system of management and personnel policies.
- D. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity

- F. Subject to the limitations of Section 768.26 Florida Statutes, CITY agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold free and harmless to the extent permitted by law, UWCK and each of its volunteers, members, agents, servants, employees, officers, and directors from and against any and all actions, claims, liabilities, assertion of liability, losses, costs, and expenses including, but not limited to, attorney fees, reasonable investigative and discovery costs, and court costs, which in any manner may arise or be alleged to have arisen, or resulted, or alleged to have resulted, from the presence and activities, or any nature or otherwise of the CITY or employees relating to this MOU, including but not limited to claims for bodily injury or death of persons, and for loss of or damage to property, including claims or loss by the city or its agents, servants, and employees. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as a waiver of the City's Sovereign Immunity Limits.

#### VI. FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS

- In the performance of this contract, UWCK shall make maximum use of products containing recovered materials that are EPA- designated items unless the product cannot be acquired-
  - a. Competitively within a timeframe providing for compliance with the contract performance schedule;
  - b. Meeting contract performance requirements; or
  - c. At a reasonable price.
- 2. Information about this requirement, along with the list of EPA- designate items, is available at EPA's Comprehensive Procurement Guidelines web site, https://www.epa.gov/smm/comprehensive-procurement-guideline-cpg-program."
- K. RETENTION OF ALL RECORDS: UWCK is required to retain all records for seven (7) years after grantees or sub-grantees make final payments and all other pending matters are closed.

#### L. ADDITIONAL FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS

1. REMEDIES – In the event of a breach by UWCK of the terms and conditions of this Agreement CITY shall be entitled to recover any and all monetary damages arising therefrom including the recovery of reasonable attorney fees at all trial and appellate levels.

#### 2. ACCESS TO RECORDS

 a. UWCK agrees to provide City, the FEMA Administrator, the Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their authorized representatives access to any books,

- documents, papers, and records of UWCK which are directly pertinent to this contract for the purposes of making audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcriptions.
- b. UWCK agrees to permit any of the foregoing parties to reproduce by any means whatsoever or to copy excerpts and transcriptions as reasonably needed and permissible by law.
- c. UWCK agrees to provide the FEMA Administrator or his authorized representatives access to construction or other work sites pertaining to the work being completed under the contract.
- DHS SEAL, LOGA AND FLAGS: UWCK shall not use the DHS seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of DHS agency officials without specific FEMA preapproval.
- 4. COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL LAW, REGUATIONS AND EXECUTIVE ORDERS: This is an acknowledgement that FEMA financial assistance will be used to fund the contract only. UWCK will comply will all applicable federal law, regulations, executive orders, FEMA policies, procedures, and directives.
- 5. NO OBLIGATION: The Federal Government is not a party to this contract and is not subject to any obligations or liabilities to the non-Federal entity, UWCK, or any other party pertaining to any matter resulting from the contract."
- FRAUD AND FALSE OR FRAUDULENT OR RELATED ACTS: The UWCK acknowledges that 31 U.S.C. Chap. 38 (Administrative Remedies for False Claims and Statements) applies to UWCK's actions pertaining to this contract.

#### VII. INTEGRATION

This agreement contains the entire understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter of the agreement, and it supersedes all prior understandings, and agreements, whether written or oral, and all prior dealings of the parties with respect to the subject matter herein.

#### VIII. MODIFICATIONS

This MOU may be modified or amended only by an instrument in writing signed by the parties hereto.

#### Proposal for a Stop-Gap Measure for COVID Support to the City of Key West

Submitted to the Key West City Commission, January 5, 2021.

#### **Description of Need**

While there is finally an end in sight to the pandemic, the immediate future remains bleak. As we await the vaccine and the next round of federal aid, our island's safety nets run thin. The virus still rages, and rapid testing is both limited and expensive. Many frontline employees are forced to pay out of pocket to get quick results. Some avoid getting tested altogether. The CARES Act funds took approximately 10 weeks to reach Monroe County after they were approved, and longer to reach community members. If a similar trend ensues for the most recently approved funds, there is an urgent need to fill the gap between now and that time

There is little help left in our community to meet our residents' basic needs. Our nonprofit organizations have exhausted most of their funds and cannot provide for much longer at this current rate, without additional support. A recent survey conducted by United Way in December 2020 of 13 nonprofit organizations in Key West, (attached), shows a gap in funds to assist residents with rent, food, utilities, medical and other essential needs.

The lack of basic provisions adds to the spread of the virus. When employees can't pay their rent or put food on the table, they are dissuaded from quarantining. There are not sufficient support systems in place to help them, and much of the workforce simply can't afford to lose more income.

The spike in COVID cases, combined with the lapse in funding and protective measures like the eviction moratorium could lead Key West into a tall spin in the coming months. If ever there were a moment to step in and fill the gap, that time is now.

#### A Key West Stop-Gap Plan for COVID (January -- end of March 2021)

The Health and Business Advisory Committee, The Key West Chamber of Commerce and the Nonprofit Community of Key West, and the Inter-Ministerial Alliance joined together in December 2020 to identify measures that would assist the community through the first quarter of 2021. The result is a Five-Part Plan, as follows:

#### 1. Free Rapid Testing (\$171, 250)

According to MCHD data, the numbers of people getting tested in Key West for COVID in a span over three months has more than tripled from 1,426 in September to 4,938 in November 2020. The average wait time for results can be between three to five days. At the same time, many

businesses report that employees are reluctant to get tested for fear of losing desperately needed income. This conundrum creates an urgent need for access to free, rapid and increased testing for COVID in Key West.

The goal of this initiative is to provide free rapid testing and follow up PCR to community members via static and mobile testing sites that are accessible in all areas of the Island. Approximately 3,000 kits will be purchased along with PPE, medical supplies and short-term testing staff. The tests will be available to residents of Key West, Stock Island and Key Haven and employees who work in Key West. They will have to provide proof of residence and/or employment to receive the test. The budget breakdown is as follows:

The test kits are for rapid testing only. Standard protocol requires that a PCR test is offered to any person who is negative on the rapid test but presents symptoms of COVID. PRC testing is paid for by insurance or federal funding for the uninsured. Testing sites will provide referrals, and /or on-site PCR testing.

AHEC is a well-placed to manage a rapid testing program in Key West. The organization has been supporting the medical needs of the Keys community for many years, and the staff are deeply involved with MCHD and our residents. AHEC will manage the process and ensure that each location is staffed and stocked in the medical equipment necessary. They will work directly with the City through their existing mechanisms to ensure that the funds are disbursed and tracked as required.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Test kits vary in availability on a daily basis. Bio Test Kits cost \$19.75 each, BD cost \$35.00 and Sofia 2 cost \$26.00. The goal would be to purchase as many Bio Test Kits as possible. The total cost may therefore be less than \$77,250, but will not exceed that amount

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> This program will utilize licenses health care providers such as Lab Staff, MA's RNs and NPs/Pas. Salary ranges for this staff generally run between \$17 -\$50 per hour.

This sum includes payroll taxes at 7.65% and a small allocation for workman's comp. AHEC normally runs 22 — 25%. This request is much lower.

#### 2. Emergency Assistance for Rent, Food, Utilities & Essential Needs and Medical

According to the United Way ALICE report, prior to COVID-19, approximately 40% of Monroe County were living paycheck to paycheck, unable to make ends meet. (ALICE stands for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed.) Those living on the edge cannot continue to survive in these times, and are slipping further behind. Our nonprofit organizations are running low on funding to assist.

The recent survey conducted by UWCK in December 2020, (referenced above,) measured the current rate at which 13 nonprofit organizations are providing support in Key West for rent, food, utilities, medical assistance and direct medical services relative to funds remaining for each of those needs. The data showed an overwhelming need and shortage of funds for rental assistance. (See summary data from the survey attached). Based on these needs and the shortfall in funds for the next 2.5 months, the request for funding is as follows:

United Way of Collier and the Keys (UWCK), has been at the forefront of the community with assistance during the pandemic. They are well placed to manage grants in these three areas to the Key West nonprofit community maximizing efficiency of City funds. They have the

(The actual need far exceeds that number.) Percentages of need were calculated by dividing the cost of service per month by the total sum remaining for that need, and calculating the approximate percentage of that need relative to the others. The data was adjusted also based on the NGOs capacity to deliver services. (See data attached).

mechanisms in place to identify and vet the needs, distribute funds, track expenses, and ensure accountability. As the lead organization working collaboratively with nonprofit partners, UWCK would also coordinate community outreach, communication and engagement, including specific

efforts working with MCHD to directly reach those who are needing to isolate, local business community for their employees and the faith-based community to reach marginalized populations.

#### 3. Quarantine Assistance Fund for Businesses (Cost To Be Determined)

While some businesses in Key West are improving, others continue to bear the brunt of the pandemic. Retail, attractions, theaters, restaurants, bars and hotels have suffered grave losses. Many employees are faced with a tradeoff between their health and their financial survival. They simply can't afford to lose more time away from work when they are in quarantine.

A Quarantine Assistance Fund would help promote the safety and financial security of our workforce. The fund would provide employees with a designated amount per day while in quarantine to help make up for lost income. Employees would work directly with a designated organization to manage the process and funds.

The efficacy of this undertaking would depend largely on the ability of a single institution's capacity to administer the funds, track, monitor and ensure accountability. Sister Season Fund has expressed interest in pursuing this initiative, but a full proposal and exploration has yet to be conducted.

This proposal does not include a specific program, but rather a recommendation that the City Commission request City to explore the feasibility of such an initiative.

#### 4. Weekly Communication Plan for the Vaccine Rollout (no cost)

As per the suggestion of the Health and Business Advisory Committee, the Mayor and City Manager agreed that there will be a weekly "COVID Information Update" sent out to the community. The updates would include four data points: 1) Number of Tests in Key West for the Week; 2) Number of Positive Cases in Key West for the Week; 3) Estimated Number of Cases in Visitors for the Week (Either from Wastewater Data or National Estimates), and 4) Number of Positive Cases in Key West Schools for the Week.

With the vaccine on the way, the authors of this proposal suggest adding a fifth data point: "Update on the Vaccine." This would include relevant information, (E.g., number of community members who have received the vaccine, timelines, availability and locations, FAQs, Etc.)

#### 5. Multi-Lingual Information on Resources from Contract Tracers (no cost)

Many community members in Key West have never needed assistance with life's essential needs until now. Contract tracers are amongst the first group of individuals to typically speak with individuals who have tested positive for COVID and may need resources to support while in quarantine. UWCK has produced a COVID-19 Resource Guide with lists and details about the organizations in our community that provide help with food, rent, utilities, medical needs, etc. The guide was recently translated into Spanish and Creole.

The MCHD has committed to sharing this information with the community through their channels of communication, and have provided a link to Contract Tracers to share with individuals through several outreach methods.

#### Summary: A Request for The City Commission to Take Action

In sum, this proposal outlines five initiatives that will help our community survive the first quarter of 2021. Two of them (points 4 and 5) cost nothing, and do not require the Commission's approval, but would benefit from their endorsement. Two of them (points 1 and 2) require funding; and it is the hope that these items will be voted on and approved by the Commission to prevent further delays in helping meet this need.

The funding request for Rapid Testing and Emergency Assistance combined through the end of March 2021 is \$380,770.

Point 3, a Quarantine Assistance Fund, requires additional exploration and the submission of a plan and corresponding budget. Should the Commission wish to proceed, they would request City Staff to submit a proposal.

The first quarter of 2021 will be a critical period in the lives of Key West residents. While we wait for the vaccine, we may struggle now more than ever from a cumulative loss of income, mounting bills, and backlog of overall needs. Our nonprofits cannot continue to bear the burden without significant support. A stop gap measure must be set into place until funds and a vaccine arrive, and we turn the corner for which we have so desperately waited.


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

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
