Florida Friendly Angler

Did you know that in Monroe County, 64% of our residents 16-65 have a recreational saltwater fishing license? Florida residents under the age of 16 and 65 and over are exempt from purchasing a fishing license, so the actual number of recreational anglers in our county is extremely high, the highest in Florida, in fact. Coupled with the fact that a high percentage of visitors come here to go fishing in the Fishing Capital of the World, that equates to a lot of time spent out on the water enjoying the beauty of the Florida Keys and catching something to cook up for dinnertime!

NOAA Fisheries estimates that more than 60% of the fish that are caught by recreational anglers are released. There are many reasons a fish may be caught and released – the species could be too small or too large for regulations, out of season, not the targeted species, or perhaps a fish that is fun to catch but not good to eat, or regulations may prohibit its take, like bonefish or tarpon. Because we have so many recreational fishing anglers, and because so many fish are released after being caught, it becomes even MORE IMPORTANT that the fish that are caught SURVIVE after being released. This is the purpose of the Florida Friendly Angler program. ...Continued on page 3

Shelly recently accomplished the following activities:

The Florida Coral Disease Outbreak Response Communication Team wrote a media release Stony Coral Tissue Loss Disease & Response on Florida's Coral Reef: Winter 2023 Overview (https:// www.flseagrant.org/stony-coral-tissueloss-disease-response-on-floridas-coralreef-winter-2022-overview/) through UF/IFAS Communications that links to the status report written by the team on the Florida Sea Grant website.



Florida Sea Grant is sponsoring two %-day sessions at the Benthic Ecology Meeting in Miami, Florida. Shelly was asked by Florida Sea Grant director, Dr. Sherry Larkin, to organize the sessions and co-lead the search to solicit abstracts for speakers and determine session themes for students and researchers. This conference is student-focused for undergraduate and graduate students presenting research on invertebrates, aquaculture, and submerged aquatic vegetation.

- Shelly returned to the Boy Scouts of America Brinton Science Center on Summerland Key for the 7th year of teaching and training the spring STEM teachers about stony coral tissue loss disease underwater observer training and Florida Keys Water Watch. The STEM teachers are college students from around the nation that spend the spring teaching Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts to earn badges in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM).

Alicia recently accomplished the following activities:

• Alicia and some of the <u>CIVIC</u> team worked to edit the <u>National Issues</u> <u>Forum, Climate Choices</u> guide to help people think about community-based solutions to climate change and we are updating this guide to include examples that speak to local efforts. Communities wanting to have a deliberate dialogue about climate choices will be able to pick from a drawdown menu of options that reflects their communities' needs and culture.



Alicia was invited to be a key informant • for the 3-day Extension Foundation Impact collaborative on climate change. The impact collaborative is where Extension program teams from across the country come to take a deep dive into program planning using skill-building tools. Teams are connected with subject matter experts in a variety of fields to help fill gaps in their program planning. Agents receive training in skill-building to catalyze innovation with Extension programs locally. Since 2019. Extension teams that have incubated through the Impact Collaborative have received more than \$5.7M in grant and partnership funding. 93% of participants identified new skills, tools, and resources to help move their projects and programs to the next level.

Alicia is working with Solar United Neighbors of Florida and has helped to launch the Florida Keys 2023 Solar Coop. Find out more at <u>SolarUnitedNeigh-bors.org/Keys</u>



Alicia is working with Paul Evens from the UF, Fort Lauderdale Research and Education Center, and the Croc Docs project, teaching people to identify and report invasive species. They have reached over 1300 individuals through 16 outreach events and seminars. In the first six months of this project, they have attained 200% more public reports of invasive species than the previous year in the upper and middle keys.

The Florida Friendly Angler is a free, narrated, online, short, do-at your-own-pace educational program that informs users about our state's aquatic environments, best practices when fishing and the inner workings of fisheries management. By teaching the how and why behind topics that anglers encounter while interacting with Florida's fisheries, the program hopes to reinforce practices that can ensure quality fishing experiences are here to stay, providing great memories and the economic impacts that follows. This program was created in partnership with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Florida Sea Grant, and the University of Florida IFAS Extension. There are three short modules on environmental ethics, best fishing practices, and fisheries management.



Florida Friendly Angler is FREE, takes less than 2 hours, and can be completed at your own pace. Google "Florida Friendly Angler," and then register with your email address. Finish the course all at once or a little at a time. The information taught is not only applicable to fishermen and women, but anyone who is interacting with the marine environment. There is boating information to prevent destroying coral when anchoring, stop sea grass scaring, and making sure that the fish you just caught and released gets back into the water and swims away.
