Update on condition of Tiger and maintenance needs

Tiger Update

I visited the welding shop today, December 12, 2016. David Radcliff, owner, gave me the run down on the project. We agreed on how to proceed on the repairs.

The Tiger has rust damage in the feet from the inside. The original "L" steel attached to the feet have rusted away.

The remedy is to use ¼" s/s plate and schedule 80 stainless steel 3" pipe welded on the bottom of the feet (paws) in the shape of the paws. The pipe would be set in concrete cylinders (drilled) with a 1" gap between the concrete and the feet. A pattern made by Mr. Radcliff will give the location of each pad (foot). Weep holds will be drilled in each foot as well as in the lowest point on the belly. Some repairs are required on the belly due to interior rust.

Welding on the paws (feet) and belly will cause some discoloration around the edge of the paws (feet) and will need to be touched up.

Mr. Radcliff and I agree the entire Tiger should be clear coated with automotive clear coat before installation.

We both agreed the Tiger will last longer than either of us.

There is no estimate of the costs involved in the repair.
