Citizen Review Board,

On July 9, 2020, the Key West Police Department received a complaint from Mr. Brad Curtis through the Citizen Review Board. Mr. Curtis' complaint is in reference to an incident that occurred on 2/15/20, in which Mr. Curtis and his wife (Cheryl Curtis) was involved in a single scooter traffic crash. Mr. Curtis was the passenger on the scooter and Mrs. Curtis was the driver. Mr. Curtis' complaint is that Officer Brett Dehanas illegally detained him and forced him to go to the hospital against his will. In doing so, Mr. Curtis has now incurred a \$4,586.00 medical bill.

As a result of this complaint, I conducted an inquiry into this incident. I reviewed all body worn camera (BWC) videos and all reports related to this incident. I also spoke with Officer Dehanas about this incident. Officer Dehanas said he initially detained Mr. Curtis in handcuffs after Mr. Curtis began to physically push his way through the rescue personnel to try to gain entry into the ambulance Mrs. Curtis was being transported in. Officer Dehanas said he did not feel Mr. Curtis was making rational decisions and he felt Mr. Curtis needed to be evaluated by the rescue personnel. Officer Dehanas said Mr. Curtis eventually calmed down and he removed the handcuffs so Mr. Curtis could be medically evaluated.

My review of Officer Dehanas' BWC videos showed rescue personnel asking Officer Dehanas to assist them with Mr. Curtis. Mr. Curtis was sitting on the ground next to Mrs. Curtis, while she was being placed onto the gurney. Mrs. Curtis had received serious injuries as a result of the crash and the rescue personnel were attempting provide her care and preparing her to be flown out to a Miami hospital. Mr. Curtis was demanding to ride in the ambulance with Mrs. Curtis. Several attempts were made to tell Mr. Curtis he was not authorized to ride in the same ambulance, but would be transported in a separate ambulance. Mr. Curtis advised he did not want medical attention for himself, he only wanted to go with Mrs. Curtis. Mr. Curtis attempted to get into Mrs. Curtis' ambulance and began physically pushing several rescue personnel and Officer Dehanas. At that time, Officer Dehanas detained Mr. Curtis in handcuffs and escorted him



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away from the area. Officer Dehanas and rescue personnel explained to Mr. Curtis that he also needed to be medically evaluated because he was bleeding from his head and had a contusion on his head. After approximately three minutes, Mr. Curtis calmed down and the handcuffs were removed. While Mr. Curtis was being further evaluated by rescue personnel, Officer Dehanas walked away to disinfect himself and attend to other responsibilities related to the crash scene. Several minutes later, rescue personnel approached Officer Dehanas and asked him to assist them in talking to Mr. Curtis because he was refusing to go to the hospital. It was their recommendation that Mr. Curtis go to the hospital to receive further medical evaluation, because he could possibly have a head injury. Officer Dehanas informed Mr. Curtis he was going to be taken into protective custody per the recommendation of rescue personnel. At that time, Mr. Curtis advised he would go with rescue personnel to the hospital and there was no further action taken by Officer Dehanas.

My review of this incident determined it was the recommendation of rescue personnel that Mr. Curtis go to the hospital. Officer Dehanas followed this recommendation because rescue personnel are trained to provide a higher level of medical care than Officer Dehanas can provide. Officer Dehanas also felt Mr. Curtis was not making rational decisions and was concerned Mr. Curtis had a possible head injury.

Although we sympathize with Mr. Curtis, and understand his desire to be with his wife, we still have an obligation and responsibility for the care of Mr. Curtis. Given the seriousness of the crash and injuries to Mrs. Curtis; and the visible injuries to Mr. Curtis, as well as a possible altered mental state, it was in the opinion of rescue personnel and Officer Dehanas that Mr. Curtis receive further medical attention. If we had let Mr. Curtis leave the scene on his own, with what was known and he later succumbed to his injuries, or further injured himself, we would be liable. All actions were only taken in the best interest of both Mr. and Mrs. Curtis. In conclusion, Officer Dehanas' actions were appropriate and within the policies and procedures of the Key West Police Department and in the best interest of Mr. Curtis given the information at hand.



Subject: Unwarranted handcuffing

Hello Mr. Pakenas, I was talking with Todd Stoughton today about the following incident and he recommended that I reach out to you.

On February 15, 2020 I was involved in a single vehicle moped accident at the corner of Roosevelt and Overseas Highway at about 5:00 PM. I was a passenger riding behind my wife Cheryl Curtis. She was knocked out and I was slightly stunned but never lost consciousness. I was a rescuer for eight years and did a self assessment prior to moving.

My wife was cared for very well by all very professional EMTs and was loaded into a paramedic vehicle for air transport to Miami. The general consensus on scene was that she was a probable fatality and probably would have been had she hit the pavement instead of my sneaker.

A little background on myself is in order so you can understand my personality; I have been flying airplanes since 1984 and a certified scuba diving since 1972 and as such have exceptional self control. I can assure you I was never out of control or combative on the scene.

Now, onto my problem, one of the uniformed officers on scene demanded that I go to LKMC for a cat scan, I politely declined. He then asked me to sep over to his car and I quietly complied. At that point the officer turned me to face the scene and handcuffed me with himself between me and his car.

I asked him if I was being arrested, he replied "no but your going to the hospital" I then said " if going to the hospital is the fastest way to Miami then I guess I have no choice. Please let me out of the cuffs and I will get into the ambulance and get a cat scan." So I went.

I incurred a \$4,500 bill for a negative CAT scan that I was forced to get against my will and while I was in a calm and lucid mental state.

Now I realize the police have a hard job and the officer was looking out for my best

interest but according to Captain Smith he was also mitigating the cities liability in case I went dark.

I have a right to refuse medical treatment and I strongly feel that I was illegally detained. This has never happened to me so I'm not sure how to proceed. Can you please advise.
