


Why Does

Plan?




- Unemployment <u>quadrupled</u> since March
- 3,000 workers may leave
- The need for food has doubled
- 40% of funding for homeless prevention for the year was spent in 2 months
- We have <u>233 Covid cases</u> this month so far, up from 124 in Sept.



DO WE REALLY HAVE A FOOD CRISIS IN KW?

- SOS is serving <u>13,000</u> people per month since Covid began (up from 6,000)
- 52% of students in Key West receive reduced and free lunch
- Food stamp requests doubled in the past month
- Food agencies spending \$100,00 per month. They are almost out of funds

WHAT HAS COVID DONE TO HOUSING?

- Rental assistance from AH went from \$45,000 per month to \$82,000 in KW since March
- FKOC and Catholic Charities exhausted their funds
- Combined, our agencies have \$125,000 left. They can support the need for no more than 2 months



Actions from the Humanitarian Side of the Plan (7)

Food Security and Housing

1. Feed KW

Pursue Federal CARES Act & FEMA funding to meet increased need (\$200,000)

2. Back Pack Children's Program

Weekend and holiday food for children who are facing food insecurity

3. Housing Assistance

Pursue Federal funding, develop future stop gap measures (\$300,000)

PROGRESS UPDATE ON FOOD AND HOUSING

* Pending BOCC Approval

Food: \$315,000 (phase 2)

City pursuing reimbursement to FEMA for \$250,000 for SOS + \$160,000

Housing: \$1 Million (phase 3)

What Will Change in the Lives of our Community Members as a Result of the KEY WEST RECOVERS Plan?



- Tourists will feel welcomed but encouraged to be safe:
 Sit outdoors, attend our festivals, and respect the island = more business & employment
- 2. More people will stay in their homes through March 2021 (\$1 million)
- 3. Mitigate the mass exodus post moratorium on evictions
- 4. No family or child in our community will lack food for the next 6 months or more (\$315,000)
